As per Modern Chrono-biology the rhythmic patterns are very fundamental to all living systems. Life exists within a sea of vibration, and rhythm is fundamental to all life. This rhythmic system is the base for communication and guidance in entire universe towards health and well being in all existing systems irrespective of the fact that it is present on earth, in deep see, in skies or beyond the limits of the universe. This paper undertakes a comparative study of Islamic and Western perspectives on the rhythmic structure and existential fabric of the universe, with particular emphasis on scriptural references, metaphysical underpinnings, and cosmological insights.

Islam and the Western philosophical and scientific traditions have each developed intricate cosmologies to address this issue. In Islam, the Qur'an offers detailed imagery of a universe created with balance, purpose, and rhythm.

In the West, from ancient Greek philosophy to modern astrophysics, the concept of order and regularity in the cosmos has been a recurring theme. Though there was no confirming proposition with the West and Greek philosophy. Quran has given definitive explanation of rhythm in universe.

Here to explore the Islamic perspective on the rhythm and existence of the universe and life, analyze Western interpretations from philosophical, scientific, and theological lenses, compare the metaphysical and empirical bases of both worldviews, present insights on how rhythm reflects divine or natural law



Defining Rhythm: Beyond Musical Boundaries

The general dictionary meaning of Rhythm is described as an ordered recurrent alternation of strong¹.

Rhythm (from Greek origin - *rhythmos*, meaning "measured motion, proportion") is an ordered pattern of recurrence—a structured flow of movement in time, marked by the alternation of contrasting or repeating elements. It is a fundamental organizing principle in music, poetry, dance, nature, and even human physiology and all living and non living things. Without rhythm, existence of anything whether living or non living would not be possible.

Key Aspects of Rhythm

1. **Temporal Structure** – Rhythm operates in time, creating a sense of pulse, tempo, and duration.
2. **Repetition & Variation** – It relies on recurring patterns (beats, cycles) but can also incorporate syncopation or asymmetry.
3. **Hierarchy & Phrasing** – Strong and weak beats form metrical groupings.
4. **Dynamic Flow** – Unlike a static pattern, rhythm implies motion, tension, and release (e.g., the ebb and flow of ocean waves).
5. **Synchronization**: it can be found in large flocks of birds flying in the skies with rhythmic flow, fish in the ocean, continuous long duration of clapping by a large group like in music hall, Stadiums etc. Armed forces drill particularly on a bridge. These are some common examples which can be perceived by anyone during his life time. All these are forms of rhythm.

Examples Across Domains

- **Music**: A drumbeat's sequence (e.g., 4/4 time: *boom-chick-boom-chick*).
- **Poetry**: Meter in Shakespeare's lines ("*Shall I compare thee to a summer's day?*").
- **Nature**: The circadian rhythm of sleep/wake cycles.
- **Divine/Philosophical**: The cyclical order of seasons, planetary orbits, or Hindu *Yugas* (cosmic time cycles).

The Concept of Rhythm in Islam

Qur'anic View of Cosmic Order

The Cosmic pulse is one of the most important studies of rhythm. The expansion and contraction concepts are also given in the Holy Quran. The Orbits and their times are systematically going on continuously. There is a well standard balance in each thing in the universe and cosmic world. It is now proved by the scientists that each planet has its own time management despite of the fact that all the planets are revolving in around the Sun. The said balance is also mentioned in The Holy Quran. "ووضع الميزان"² and He sets the balance.² The Qur'an frequently speaks of the heavens and the earth as being created in a deliberate, measured fashion *إنا كل شيء خلقناه بقدر*³.

The movement of sun and the moon is rhythmic motion when the said rhythm will broke down, the existence of both will not be possible. There are certain hidden forces regarding movement of the sun and the moon so also other planets, stars etc. time will come when scientists shall surely come to know about such forces which are holding such powerful rhythm.

The use of the word "**Qadr**" (measure, decree, order) implies an intrinsic rhythm to creation. The daily cycle of night and day, the orbits of celestial bodies, and the balance of ecosystems all point to divine orchestration or plan of Allah.

It is also interpreted by Scholars that the Dooms day is breaking of rhythm. إِذَا السَّمَاءُ انْفَطَرَتْ (1) وَإِذَا الْكَوَاكِبُ (2) (انْتَثَرَتْ) (3) إِذَا الْبِحَارُ فُجِّرَتْ (3). When the order of rhythm is broken, the entire universe and all systems of existence and life come to an end by order of Allah.

Blowing of trumpet and disbursement of universe.

فَإِذَا نُفِخَ فِي الصُّورِ نَفْخَةٌ وَاحِدَةٌ

Then when the Trumpet will be blown with one blowing (the first one),

And the earth and the mountains shall be removed from their places, and crushed with a single crushing,

Then on that Day shall the (Great) Event befall, And the heaven will split asunder, for that Day it (the heaven will be frail (weak), and torn up.

Big Bang Theory and Quran

The Holy Quran has discussed theory of separation of heavens and the earth in Surah Al-Anbiya. Allah (SWA) says:

أَوَلَمْ يَرَ الَّذِينَ كَفَرُوا أَنَّ السَّمَوَاتِ وَالْأَرْضَ كَانَتَا رَتْقًا فَفَتَقْنَاهُمَا ۖ وَجَعَلْنَا مِنَ الْمَاءِ كُلَّ شَيْءٍ حَيٍّ أَفَلَا يُؤْمِنُونَ⁴

Do not the Unbelievers see that the heavens and the earth were joined together [as one unit of creation], before we clove them asunder? We made from water every living thing. Will they not then believe?⁵

The Hadith of the Holy prophet Muhammad (PBUH)

The Holy Quran is itself in a particular rhythmic series. The best rhythm is found in Soorah Al-Rahman. Chapter 55 verses 1 to 4 and many other verses in same chapter. Quran itself emphasizes that it should be read with measured rhythm. Surah al Muzzammil so emphasized⁶. ورتل القرآن ترتيلاً: المزمّل.

“...and recite the Qur'an in slow, measured rhythmic tones.”

Tafsir and Islamic Philosophy

Islamic scholars such as Al-Ghazali, Ibn Sina (Avicenna), and Al-Farabi examined cosmic order through metaphysical lenses. For instance, Ibn Sina saw the universe as a reflection of the Necessary Being (God), whose emanation leads to a cascading rhythm of existence from the Divine to the material.

Abu Hamid Al-Ghazali (1058-1111) defended the Quranic view of temporal creation against philosophical arguments for an eternal universe. He argued that God created both the world and time itself at a specific moment, establishing the rhythmic framework within which creation unfolds.

Al-Ghazali's water-clock analogy illustrates divine rhythm: just as a water-clock requires continuous flow to function, the universe requires constant divine sustenance to maintain its rhythmic patterns. This perspective emphasizes that cosmic rhythms are not autonomous but depend on Allah's continuous creative action.

Mystic (Sufi) Interpretations

The Ontological Pulse (Creation as Divine Audition): In Sufi metaphysics, the act of creation is fundamentally acoustic. The divine command "*Kun*" (Be!) is not a silent decree but a resonant vibrational frequency that ripples outward, setting all of existence into immediate motion. Rumi's assertion that "You are the universe in ecstatic motion" is therefore literal: matter itself is frozen or condensed rhythm. The rotation of planets, the oscillation of light, and the cycles of birth and decay are all sustained by God's perpetual act of "self-disclosure" (*tajalli*). Rhythm, in this view, is **the audible trace of the Creator's breath**—meaning the universe does not *have* a rhythm; it *is* a rhythm.

The Centrifugal Ascent (Whirling as Spiritual Geometry): The Sema (whirling ceremony) is often misinterpreted as a mere dance of joy. In expanded Sufi thought, the dervish's rotation is a precise act of **spiritual aerodynamics**. The left hand faces downward (receiving earthly gravity), while the right hand faces upward (receiving celestial mercy), and the body pivots on its own axis. This mimics the heliocentric solar system, but more profoundly, it mimics the heart's paradoxical journey: the faster the physical rotation, the deeper the internal stillness of the soul. The rhythm of the whirling, anchored to the hypnotic beat of the *kudüm* (drum) and the haunting breath of the *ney* (flute), creates a centrifugal force that **flings the ego's density outward**, leaving the practitioner hollow, empty, and capable of being fully "played" by the divine breath.

Zikir as Cardiac Entrainment (The Rhythm of Remembrance): While Zikir (remembrance) is vocal, its expanded purpose is **somatic recalibration**. ("اگرچہ ذکر کا تعلق زبان سے ہے، لیکن اس کا وسیع تر مقصد جسمانی و اعصابی توازن کی از سر نو ترتیب ہے۔") The Sufi does not merely chant divine names with the tongue; they anchor specific syllables to the physical heartbeat and the inhalation/exhalation of the lungs. For example, "La" is breathed in (negating everything except God), and "Il-Allah" is breathed out (affirming divine reality). This rhythmic entrainment serves a neurological purpose: it deliberately overrides the brain's default mode network (the seat of ego and anxious rumination). Over time, the repetition ceases to be a voluntary action and becomes an *autonomous pulse* of the soul. The Prophet Muhammad's saying, "*For everything there is a polish, and the polish for the heart is the Zikir,*" implies that rhythm is the **abrasive that sands away the rust of worldly attachment**, restoring the heart to its original, clear, and rhythmic frequency.

The Collapse of Linear Time (Al-Waqt – The Eternal Now): The most radical expansion of Sufi rhythm is its relationship to temporality. Western rhythm is sequential (beat 1, beat 2, beat 3). Sufi rhythmic practice—whether through whirling, chanting, or breathing—is designed to induce a state known as *al-waqt* (the immediate present moment). By repeating a cyclical rhythm, the mind loses its grip on past regrets and future anxieties. The rhythm spirals inward until the practitioner experiences what Sufis call *fana* (annihilation of the ego). In this state, the distinction between the dancer, the dance, and the Divine Beloved dissolves. Rhythm is no longer a measurement of time passing; it becomes a **vortex through which eternity enters time**. The dervish is not moving *through* space; they are moving *in* God, and the rhythm is the vehicle for that ontological relocation.

The Concept of Rhythm in the Western Tradition

To understand the evolution of rhythm in the Western tradition, one must look beyond the boundaries of modern musical notation and return to antiquity, where rhythm was understood not merely as a temporal subdivision of sound, but as the governing principle of the cosmos itself. In the ancient Greek mindset,



rhythmos (derived from *rhein*, meaning "to flow") implied a structured, measured motion imposed upon the chaotic flux of reality. For the pre-Socratics and classical philosophers, rhythm was the bridge between mathematics, metaphysics, and the physical universe.

The Pythagorean Cosmos and the "Music of the Spheres"

The earliest structured ideas of cosmic rhythm in the Western canon are found in the mystical mathematics of Pythagoras and his followers in the 6th century BCE. The Pythagoreans made the revolutionary discovery that the intervals of the musical scale could be expressed in precise mathematical ratios (such as 2:1 for the octave, 3:2 for the fifth, and 4:3 for the fourth). If earthly music was governed by number and proportion, they reasoned, then the macrocosm must follow the same divine architecture. This birthed the concept of the **Musica Universalis** or the "Music of the Spheres."

The Pythagoreans posited that the great celestial bodies like the sun, moon, and planets, revolved in their respective orbits at speeds proportional to musical intervals. This massive, coordinated movement produced an all-encompassing, celestial harmony. Because this cosmic rhythm is continuous and has been playing since the moment of our birth, it forms the silent background noise of existence, remaining imperceptible to ordinary human ears. Here, rhythm is defined as the ultimate mathematical harmony of the universe, where astronomy, geometry, and music merge into a singular, pulsing fabric of reality.

The Platonic Demiurge and the Geometric Soul of the Universe

Plato elevated this Pythagorean geometric mysticism into a comprehensive cosmological framework, most notably in his dialogue, the *Timaeus*. Plato described the universe not as a collection of dead matter, but as a **living creature endowed with a soul and intelligence**. According to the *Timaeus*, this living cosmos was crafted by a divine architect, the **Demiurge**, who looked to the eternal, unchanging realm of Forms to fashion the material world out of primordial chaos.

Mathematical Proportion: To infuse the cosmic body and soul with order, the Demiurge utilized a rigorous framework of mathematical proportions and geometric progressions. **Temporal Architecture:** Time itself was created as a "moving image of eternity," ticking away in regular, predictable cycles through the dance of the days, months, and years.

For Plato, the human soul shares an intrinsic structural affinity with this cosmic soul. However, our incarnate existence often disrupts our internal alignment, throwing our thoughts and spirits into chaotic dissonance. Plato argued that human artistic rhythm and musical harmony were granted to us by the Muses not for mindless amusement, but as a therapeutic tool: to correct the discordant revolutions of our inner selves and bring our personal, human rhythms back into synchronization with the beautiful, divine proportions of the cosmos.

The Aristotelian Unmoved Mover and Eternal Kinematics

Where Plato focused on the ideal forms and the soul of the cosmos, Aristotle approached the universe through the lens of metaphysics and teleology (the study of purpose). In his *Metaphysics* and *Physics*, Aristotle addressed the ultimate source of all motion and rhythm, formulating the concept of the **Unmoved Mover** (*Primum Movens*). Aristotle argued that every motion in the physical world requires a prior cause. To avoid an infinite regress, there must exist a primary, eternal, and completely immutable substance that initiates all movement without itself being moved. The Unmoved Mover causes motion not through physical force, but by attraction, acting as the ultimate object of desire and love (*eros*) toward which the entire universe strives. Driven by this divine aspiration, the celestial bodies—composed of the pure, incorruptible element of ether, move in **perfect, uninterrupted, and circular paths**. Because circular motion has no beginning and no end, it represents the most perfect and eternal rhythm possible. The rotation of the spheres is absolute in its consistency, providing a permanent, predictable cadence that filters down into the sublunary world.



In the Aristotelian tradition, this cosmic rhythm is the physical manifestation of nature's longing for the divine. The cyclical turning of the stars, the predictable changing of the seasons, and the rhythmic cycles of generation and decay on Earth are all echoes of the eternal, unbroken kinematics set in motion by the Unmoved Mover.

Biblical View

Rhythm as the "Cosmic Metronome" (The Framework of Existence): The verses provided; "He established the moon for the seasons; the sun knows its going down." (Psalm 104:19) and "Thus says the Lord, who gives the sun for a light by day, and the fixed order of the moon and the stars for a light by night." Jeremiah 31:35, are not merely poetic observations about nature; they establish the celestial bodies as a **universal metronome**. In the ancient Near Eastern context, surrounding cultures worshipped the sun and moon as deities with capricious wills. The biblical text deliberately demythologizes them, reducing them to *functional timekeepers* set by a singular Creator. This means rhythm is not an accidental byproduct of physics, but the very scaffolding upon which human life is built. The "fixed order" (*choq* in Hebrew) implies a legal statute engraved into the fabric of matter—suggesting that rhythm is the language God uses to prevent the universe from descending into primordial chaos.

Rhythm as Theological Assurance (The Anchor of Faithfulness): In Jeremiah 31:35, this cosmic rhythm is directly tied to the certainty of God's covenant with Israel. The text implies a radical conditional: *As long as the sun rises and the moon waxes and wanes, My commitment to you stands*. Therefore, in an article on rhythm, this angle reframes rhythm not as a mechanical tick-tock, but as **audible proof of reliability**. In a world of human fickleness, broken promises, and historical upheaval, the unbroken rhythm of day and night becomes the ultimate anchor for human trust. It suggests that rhythm speaks to our deepest psychological need for security—the assurance that despite our failures, the "downbeat" of creation never falters. These passages affirm that rhythm in nature reflects divine will and constancy.

Scientific Developments

From Newton's laws of motion to Einstein's theory of relativity, Western science has evolved a complex understanding of cosmic mechanics. Newton's concept of a clockwork universe governed by immutable laws echoed the deterministic rhythm of earlier theology.

Later, quantum mechanics and chaos theory introduced new notions of probabilistic and dynamic rhythms.

Biological Rhythm

All the life exists within a sea of vibration and rhythm. The rhythm is fundamental to all life. Without rhythm existence of life is not possible. Diurnal⁷ seasonal, Lunar, Solar Cycles and resonant electromagnetic field oscillations of the planet earth make up the symphony of rhythms in which life on the Earth Exists. The life evolves amidst the natural rhythms, they are integrated into many basic human biological responses, which coincide with diurnal and seasonal cycles. All the human sleep patterns depend on the rhythm of system particularly on the rhythm of Moon.

Our lives are filled with countless rhythms, from vibrations at the atomic and molecular levels to the pace of biochemical reactions. Rhythms such as breathing, heartbeat, and brain activity have been widely studied and are closely tied to our emotions, thoughts, and psycho-spiritual well-being. For instance, breathing is regulated through a complex interplay between the brainstem and higher brain regions—including the limbic system and the cortex—forming a fundamental connection between respiration and emotional states. Every signaling event in the body of even single cellular there is rhythms. It is now well known that the central nervous system is also acting of biorhythms emerging from self sustaining cellular and sub cellular oscillators. All the life exists within sea of vibration, rhythm and tone which has a marvelous balance.

Comparative Metaphysical Insights

Divine Will vs. Natural Law

In Islam, rhythm is an expression of **divine will**—a constantly renewed act of creation (*Tajdid al-Khalq*). In the Western scientific tradition, rhythm is often explained by **natural law**—objective principles that do not require ongoing divine intervention.

Yet, Christian theology, especially in Thomistic traditions, reconciles divine sustenance with natural law, not unlike Islamic *Tawheed*.

Time and Temporality

In Islam, time is **cyclical yet purposeful**—the Day of Judgment is the ultimate destination. In Western thought, time has been seen both **linearly (Christian eschatology)** and **cyclically (Greek philosophy)**.

Human Place in the Rhythmic Cosmos

In the cosmic world the rhythm plays the most important role. Humans are always subject to natural rhythm. As discussed, the biological rhythm, sleep cycles, hormonal fluctuations, and heartbeat synchronization with specific musical wave. Another impact of the rhythm in the human life is the seasonal changes, lunar cycles and light waves. The environmental Rhythms are most important things in the continuity of the life cycle not only human being but also other beings and articles which exist in the universe. The social gatherings and religious rituals is also one type of rhythm.

Both traditions affirm the human being as a microcosm reflecting the macrocosm. In Islam:

"We will show them Our signs in the horizons and within themselves until it becomes clear to them that it is the truth." (Qur'an 41:53)

In the Western tradition, from the Renaissance to modern humanism, the human mind has been central to decoding the universe's rhythm. Rhythms show up in many fields of life. It affects the feelings of routine life of human being throughout different seasons and ages. The moods and attitudes are deeply affected by rhythm of the universe. It shows that the rhythm of universe is unique and not constant. If it would have been constant than that would have equally and simultaneously affected everyone in the universe but it does not so. the language used by creatures is a rhythmic tone which differs from individual to individual and species to others. The rhythms are then synchronized for essential manifestation of living process or in other words existence of objects in a particular manner, shape and size. The human life is, now a days, being affected adversely by Electromagnetic Fields (EMF) and Extremely Low Frequency (ELF). The use of resonances by wave propagation in the earth life, cellphone waves, Wi-Fi stations etc.

Contemporary Reflections: Physics and Mysticism

The Big Bang Theory is deemed to be the beginning of the universe. As per scientists about 13.8 billion years ago universe started from an infinitely dense and hot singularity and rapidly expanded and continues to expand till date. It was the moment when all the laws of physics, time, space, matter and rhythm started (Allah knows the exact time and nature of such theories).

Modern cosmology (Big Bang theory, string theory) aligns in interesting ways with mystical ideas from both traditions:

- The expanding universe echoes Qur'anic verses: "*We are expanding it*" (Qur'an 51:47).



- Quantum entanglement parallels notions of **universal unity** found in Sufism and Christian mysticism.

Rhythm Beyond Music

The Rhythm is more than a musical term. It is a concept that signifies specific ordered repetition, cycles, timing and predictable patterns. In the nature and universe, till known to the human being, are most significant such as Day and Night, Seasons of the year, Heartbeat in living organisms, Planetary orbits, pulsars and cosmic frequencies. As we came to know that the Big Bang was the initial beat that started the cosmic rhythm. The basic and the foremost introduction of such beat was the introduction of time. The entire universe and its all ingredients, visible or invisible, follow Ordered Physical Laws, creating specific cycles and patterns, due to such basic rhythm. Such harmonious rhythms are present in the entire universe as a whole and in each individual particle of creation irrespective of living being or non living being, moving things or stationary things.

Philosophical and spiritual thoughts are also available regarding rhythm. In many spiritual traditions like Sufism, Taoism, vedic philosophy, and others talk about rhythm of creation and cosmic dance. Thus Big Bang is also metaphorically described as **first beat of divine rhythm**. It resulted in dance of galaxies and life in the entire universe.
